

Who's Who in Climate Change in India Poznan 2008 edition

Launched on December 9th 2008 at the United Nations conference on climate change in Poznan, Poland, this is CSM's most recent contribution to building a movement on climate change in India. Published as the second edition of the popular pilot launched in March 2008 to coincide with Al Gore's visit to India, this bumper edition is an invaluable resource connecting people and institutions on the greatest challenge of our age.

Now running close to 400 pages, the 'Who's Who' provides details on climate change initiatives taking place at virtually every level and in most parts of India. From community organizations to large multinational corporations, action on climate change is growing in response to concerns that the country needs to urgently address climate risks. Compiled by CSM as a result of two years of focused work raising awareness on climate change and developing a pro-active national agenda, the book provides a guide to who is doing what and where in India.

Containing a Foreword by Uday Khemka and an Introduction by Malini Mehra, the book seeks to promote information exchange, encourage partnership development and inform policymaking. It shows that there is a true movement emerging from below on the issues. Policymakers everywhere should take note.
